

Kids and Camelids Superintendent's Letter by Susan Rich

It is such a common thing to say, you hardly notice it any more when someone drops the line: "it takes a village," but I really and truly and pinky swear mean it. In fact, we had as many adults working the show as we had youth handlers participating. After postponing the show once due to rain on the originally scheduled day, June 15th proved to be a hospitable second choice. It was a lovely, sunny but not too hot, day in Wilton, California. We moved the events right along and ended before the heat of the day hit and everyone had run out of gas. In short, it was a great day.

We tried some new things this year:

ONE: We offered a **showmanship clinic** with a talented and experienced show-woman providing tips to the kids in the shade of Kathy's front yard.

TWO: We followed the showmanship clinic with a **showmanship class** right afterwards so that the youth could put into practice what they had just learned.

THREE: We had the Juniors in the arena on obstacles while running **simultaneous events** for the Intermediate and Senior participants in the front yard and vice versa, so we could comfortably offer the new additions to Kids & Camelids without unduly lengthening the day's event.

FOUR: We had LANA's first (and maybe only — time will tell) **Camelid T-shirt Contest**. During the lunch break, contestants, their family members and friends, and the LANA Board members putting on the show strutted their T-shirt stuff. We had several categories: cutest, best play on words, best graphic and an open-ended category which the voters could fill in. Ribbons were awarded all around!

FIVE: We offered **multiple judges**. Each of the classes had a different judge or set of judges who helped with the more detailed walk-throughs and conferred with exhibitors immediately after completion of the performance courses. Providing a different set of eyes for each and having a detailed "post mortem" for the kids really allowed the youth to understand what judges look for consistently and what might be more personal and subjective criteria.

The Kids & Camelids Show is near and dear to my heart. As a 4-H leader and recovering high school English teacher, I welcome any event that is a positive, learning experience

for the youth handlers. For two of the seven exhibitors this was their very first show. We try to take more time during the walk-throughs to provide helpful hints about how to approach obstacles to improve the chances of successful completion. And the immediate feedback from the judge, right after completing a course, ensures that both the judge and the youth handler remember the course's layout, the obstacles and the details of the performance at each of the eight or ten stops.

I also admit that I derive a creative sense of satisfaction out of repurposing ribbons for this event. Collecting craft supplies, do-dads, old LANA medals, and camelid accoutrement, and spending a long day in my kitchen with the glue gun fired up, the ironing board at the ready, and notions spread over every surface in multiple rooms — it is just plain fun. And my Scottish heart is happy to waste nothing and give these treasures a new life. I am thankful to all the adult handlers who have provided me with their prized stash of ribbons from bygone days.

As you might have already guessed with all these innovations to the show, we choose not to sanction this event with ALSA or the ILR. We are free to have volunteer judges who are not anointed by a particular organization. We are free to intervene when youth struggle with an animal at a particular obstacle. We are free to really teach during the show and that is why we frequently refer to this event as a "show-nic" — part show and part clinic. Throughout the history of the show, we have interspersed fun events and contests and art projects. Every year, the show is a little bit different and hopefully a little bit better.

Huge thank you's to:

Kathy Nichols who is the hostess for this event. She spends an inordinate amount of time preparing her property for our arrival. She is the keeper of obstacles, the designer of the courses, and she hauls the obstacles out and puts them away. She provides a hospitality table in the morning, making sure the adults have access to coffee and all guests have goodies to get their day started. She is also the President of LANA and the Editor of the digital newsletter that houses all these wonderful memories of the day.





Joy Pedroni is the mistress of the scoring table. She handles all the registration materials for the event, preparing her spread sheets in advance of the day. She tabulates and announces placings. And this year, she was able to take the Camelid T-shirt ballots and quickly make sense of the various categories and nominees.

Kayla Rogers provided the Showmanship Clinic and brought her years of experience and her refined expertise to share with her young colleagues. She provided the youth with helpful tips and a broad sense of how to think about showmanship in general.





Oscar García Castro gave up his Saturday to be the photographer of this event. He even dashed offsite to procure a memory card when his mother-in-law (that's me) didn't provide what was needed for the camera she provided. He is masterful at getting great shots with wonderful definition, fabulous lighting, and the right moments in the ring.



Stephanie Pedroni, hard on the heels of a business trip, arrived to step in as interim photographer when needed and obstacle helper through out the day.

Robin Muirhead, a long time "Llama Mama," returned to assist with the prize table and ribbon distribution. Robin stood as the proxy for her LANA Board member daughter, Emily. She (wo)manned the Thank You Card Table - a perennial feature of the Kids & Camelids Show - to ensure that youth exhibitor, their friends and family, had the opportunity to create thank you cards for all the adults who helped support the show.





The THREE Judges of the Event: Kathy Nichols, Stephanie Pedroni, and Kayla Rogers all volunteered to judge events. This ensured that the participants heard from a variety of experienced handlers. Repeated messages were better cemented and various perspectives were shared. I want to acknowledge **Greg Harford** who donated funds specifically for use on the youth, and so he helped to supply prizes for each of the events.

Through out the year, **Sara and Ava Mattia** search out great alpaca-themed prizes and donate them to the cause as well.

I very much appreciated **Drew Riccardi**, an innocent sibling bystander, who cheerfully left his comfortable seat in the shade to be the petter through the PR Performance course. He even smiled at his sister when she was at his obstacle.





And I want to be sure and say thank you to the **parents and family** who brought these youth exhibitors, financially support their experiences with the animals, travel the countryside to get them to events like this one, and sit for countless hours while their children do their camelid thing. There is a special place for you in heaven, I am certain.



Minimum Standards of Care for Llamas and Alpacas

Minimum Standards of Care are mandatory to Ilama and alpaca survival and humane treatment. These are the most basic requirements that all Ilamas and alpacas must have for physical well-being and, as such, define minimum requirements for animal control officers and government officials investigating questionable Ilama and alpaca care situations.

1. **WATER**: Animals should have continuous access to potable drinking water.

2. NUTRITIONAL: Animals should have nourishment adequate to sustain life and health.

3. **SHELTER**: Animals should have natural or man-made shelter that enables them to find relief from extreme weather conditions. The sheltered area must allow for the ability to stand, lie down, rest and reasonably move about.

4. **MOBILITY**: Animals should have a living area through which they can move freely and exercise independently

5. **NEGLECT**: Animals should have a physical appearance free from signs of serious neglect. Signs of serious neglect may include such things as crippled ambulation due to severely curled toenails, ingrown halters, or living conditions not meeting the minimums listed above.

6. **SAFETY**: Animals should be reasonably safeguarded from injury or death within their defined living environment and/or when traveling.

7. **CRUELTY**: Animals should be reasonably safeguarded from cruel treatment and actions that endanger life or health or cause avoidable suffering.

8. **SOCIALIZING**: Llamas and alpacas are herd animals and should not live alone without a companion animal. A cria (a baby llama or alpaca under six months) should not be apart from other llamas or alpacas.
